Text: Philippians 3:12-21

Question #1: What Experiences or encounters have helped you grow spiritually?

(3:12-14)

"Not as though I had already obtained" is the statement of a Christian who never permitted himself to be satisfied with his spiritual attainments

"Forget the Past"

- We're not here to use yesterday's struggles and victories as excuses to live complacently today.
- There were things in Paul's past that could have been weights holding him back but they became inspirations to press him ahead.

"One Thing I do"

Mark 10:21 "One thing you lack" is what Jesus said to the rich ruler.

Luke 10:42 "one thing is needful" is what Jesus said to Martha.

"One Thing I do"

John 9:25 "One thing I know" exclaimed the man who had received his sight back.

Psalm 27:4 "One thing have I desired of the Lord that will I seek after" testified the psalmist.

We can be too involved in "many things" when the secret to progressing is to concentrate on "one thing".

Principles to Grow towards Christ

- Our Reach must exceed our grasp.
- 2. It is a bad thing to be satisfied spiritually.
